

Algeria

- The capital city of Algeria is Algiers.
- Most of the people in Algeria practice the religion of Islam. Less than 1 percent are Christian and Jewish.
- The Berbers, (non-Arabic tribes) have lived in Algeria since the earliest history ever recorded, but their culture and language are slowly disappearing in favor of the Arab culture and language.
- Algeria's official language is Arabic, but many Berber dialects are used.
- Algeria is in northern Africa, bordering the Mediterranean Sea between Morocco and Tunisia.
- Algeria is the second largest country in Africa, after Sudan.
- Men often gather in coffeehouses to play checkers, chess, dominoes, and other games. Women socialize in the home.
- The Sahara desert covers more than four-fifths of Algeria.
- Most of the Algerian people live along the coastlands on only 12 percent of the country's land.
- All Algerians dress conservatively, and women are usually veiled.
- Lamb, chicken, vegetables and couscous are all popular foods, but Algerians are Muslims and do not eat pork or drink alcoholic beverages.

Recipe: Chlada Fakya

- 1/4 melon cubed
- 2 apples cubed
- 2 bananas sliced
- 5 oranges peeled, seeded, chopped
- 3/4 cup orange juice
- 1/4 cup lemon juice
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- Whipped cream

Mix all ingredients. Chill before serving. Serve with whipped cream on top.

Activity: Dominos

Dominos is a very popular game among Algerians. Walking down the streets of Algiers, you will often see many domino games taking place! But his domino game is smaller than a traditional dominos game because it is intended for children.

Shuffle/mix up dominos and place them all face down on the table. For a two player game, each player should draw 4 dominos at random, for a game with more players, each player should draw 3 dominos. Don't let the other players see your dominos.

The youngest player should go first by laying any domino on the table. Player two tries to lay a domino on the table with an image that matches what's already there. If he cannot go, he must pick a domino from the pile and miss his turn. Continue taking turns laying dominos or picking from the pile until someone wins.

To win, you must get rid of all the dominos in your hand or if no one can go, the person with the least dominos is the winner.
